INTRODUCTION

The papers consist of newspaper clippings documenting the civil rights movement in 1967. Most of the clippings originated in St. Louis newspapers. They document race relations and racial disturbances in the United States.

DONOR INFORMATION

The clippings were donated to the State Historical Society of Missouri by Thomas F. Baker on 31 October 1973 (Accession No.1044).

ORGANIZATIONAL SKETCH

The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission is a federal agency that administers and enforces civil rights laws in the workplace. It was founded in 1965 with a mandate to enforce title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act, which prohibits discrimination in hiring on the basis of race, creed, color or national origin. Other laws that the EEOC enforces is the Age Discrimination in Employment Act of 1967, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, and the ADA Amendments Act of 2008. The EEOC consists of a presidentially appointed commission that must receive Congressional approval.
