Abstract: Collection primarily consists of the published and unpublished articles Crotty wrote regarding the local history of Jackson County, Missouri. His interests focused mainly on Dallas, Missouri, the Watts Mill area, and the New Santa Fe Trail. In addition there are some newspaper articles not written by Crotty that give background on these topics, as well as some biographical information on Crotty, and his travels.

Historical Note:

William Lee Crotty was born January 6, 1896, in Rosedale, Kansas. In 1915, he moved to Dallas, Missouri, later called Watts Mill, where he would stay for the rest of his life. The following year, Crotty married Elsie, and together they had two children.

He was a member of the Masonic Lodge in Grandview, Missouri, and was installed as Master of the Lodge in 1950 by President Harry S. Truman. In 1990, he was made Honorary Mayor of the Watts Mill area. In 1983, Elsie passed away, and he followed in September 1991.

Although Crotty was a master welder by trade, local history was his passion. His main interest was the Watts Mill neighborhood in which he lived, but he also researched the Santa Fe Trail, State Line Road, and other points of interest around Jackson County, Missouri. Much of his work was published locally.

The collection has been arranged into the following three series and one subseries. The items within the collection have been arranged chronologically:

Personal History Articles Dallas, Missouri Oversize

Scope and Content Note:

Personal

This series contains biographical material related to William Crotty. Included is an autobiographical account of a trip Crotty and his wife took in the 1920's, some genealogical research Crotty did on his mother's adoptive family, and newspaper clippings about Crotty just before and directly after his passing. In addition, there are some research notes regarding the Leawood area.

History Articles

This series, which makes up the majority of the collection, consists of the published and unpublished non-scholarly articles Crotty wrote about the local history of the Kansas City area. Included in this series are short articles on the New Santa Fe Trail, the history of State Line Road, and Martin City. Of particular interest is the subseries on Dallas, Missouri, which was the focus of Crotty's research. Included in this subseries are short articles on the history of the Watts Mill itself, and Dallas, Missouri.

Oversize

This series contains newspaper articles written by other authors regarding the historical topics in which Crotty was interested. There is also an article regarding Dallas, Missouri, written by Crotty published as three-part article in a local newsletter.
