Historical Note:

Seneca, Missouri, founded in 1869 in present day Newton County, was named for the Seneca Indian tribe. In 1870, the town had a population of 285. By 2010 there were 2,336 people living in Seneca. A major industry in Seneca is American Tripoli, the producers of a naturally occurring microcrystalline silica, which is used as a metal polishing compound.

Seneca is located in the Lost Creek Valley. The Frisco Railroad ran through this valley and until 1959 most of the traffic travelling to Oklahoma, did so via Highway 60 which ran through Seneca, causing the town to be a thriving stop. The town is also no stranger to tragedy and hardship. In 1959, the town suffered a devastating flood. Flooding remains a problem in Seneca and as recently as 2017, the town flooded yet again. They were also the victims of a 2008 F4 tornado that killed 13 people.
